Introduction to The Book of Galatians

The churches that Paul founded in Galatia (Acts 13 - 14) were invaded by false teachers like those Paul had refuted in the Jerusalem Council (Acts 15). These false teachers are called Judaizers because they tried to bring Christians into bondage to the Law of Moses.

Paul wrote this letter to magnify God's grace in salvation and to explain the freedom of God's people because of grace.

Paul opens his letter (chapters 1-2) with a personal affirmation explaining how God delivered him from bondage through faith in Christ Jesus.

He then gives a doctrinal explanation (chapters 3-4) showing the relationship between law and grace.

In closing, Paul makes a practical application (chapters 5-6) that tells how to enjoy grace and freedom in daily life.
