#### Pastor's Desk

Everyone knows the Lord's Prayer. Without a doubt, it is the best-known passage in the Bible. One problem we have with the Lord's Prayer is that it is so familiar we often repeat it mechanically. We say the prayer, but it has no real meaning for us. We don't tie it into the level of our hoping and dreaming, laughing, and crying, living, and dying.

Do you realize that the words "I," "my," and "me" do not occur once in the Lord's Prayer? Yet while saying "Our Father," it is easy to mean only "my Father"; to utter the words "give us this day our daily bread" and still think only in terms of "give me my daily bread"; or to make a mental substitution of "forgive me my trespasses" for the actual words "forgive us our trespasses." These lines of Charles Thompson may help you avoid the tendency to be self-centered while praying:

You cannot pray the Lord's Prayer, and even once say "I." You cannot pray the Lord's Prayer, and even once say "my." *Nor can you pray the Lord's Prayer, and not pray for another,* For when you ask for daily bread, you must include your brother and sisters.

*For others are included, in each and every plea:* From the beginning to the end of it, it does not once say "me."

In today's Gospel episode, having just taught the disciples the "Our Father," Jesus says to them, "Ask, and it will be given to you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened to you" (Lk. 11:9). But we would be wrong to imagine that Jesus was glorifying our petty, selfish "I, Me, My" prayers. Indeed, in the Sermon on the Mount, He had advised us to the contrary:

I tell you, do not "worry about your life, and what you are to eat, nor about your body and how you are to clothe it. Surely life means more than food, and the body more than clothing! Think of the flowers growing in the field; they never have to work or spin; yet I assure you that not even Solomon in all his regalia was robed like one of these. Now if this is how God clothes the grass in the field, which is there today and thrown into the furnace tomorrow, will He not much more look after you, you men of little faith? So do not worry. Set your hearts on his Kingdom first and all these things will be given you as well" (Mt. 6:25, 28-31,33).

A clergy member once said to Abraham Lincoln, "Mr. President, let us have faith that the Lord is on our side in the struggle." Lincoln replied, "It is my constant anxiety and prayer that I and this nation may be on the Lord's side."

As a people, we pray incessantly in times of great tragedy or impending disaster. For example, if the terror of war threatens us, we storm the Heavens with our peace petitions: "Lord, give us peace." But such prayers may have a hollow ring when the question is raised: Where were we as a people when Jesus was reminding us, repeatedly, "Blessed are the peacemakers?" Where are we as a people when reminded daily of the senseless acts of violence that pervade our troubled land? Do we respond by tuning into God and listening for direction on how we, as a people, should work for peace?

On the individual level, if, for example, you are faced with the problem of a broken family, you can get down on your knees and ask God to heal the relationship. But you would do well to "pause a while" and listen in your innermost being for Divine guidance in that situation: "Lord, what would You have me do to make my family whole again?"

# **Discussion Questions**

Gospel: Luke 11:1-13

In giving us the "Lord's Prayer," does Jesus include us with him as brothers and sisters with God as our father? Why does Pope Francis say that this might be the most precious gift Jesus gave us during his earthly mission?

He delivers the "Lord's Prayer" to them, perhaps the most precious gift left to us by the Divine Master during his earthly mission. After revealing to us his mystery as Son and brother, with that prayer Jesus allows us to enter into God's paternity. I want to underscore this: when Jesus teaches us the "Our Father," he allows us to enter into God's paternity and he points the way to enter into a prayerful and direct dialogue with him, through the path of filial intimacy. It is a dialogue between a father and his son, of a son with his father.

What we ask in the "Our Father" is already fulfilled for us in his Only-begotten Son: the sanctification of the Name, the advent of the Kingdom, the gift of bread, of forgiveness and of delivery from evil. As we ask, we open our hand to receive. To receive the gifts that the Father has shown us in his Son, ... always in communion with our brothers and sisters. ... We often feel the need to stop at the first word, "Father," and feel that paternity in our heart.
