October begins with a reminder that we are connected to Christians around the world, with World Communion Sunday on October 1. That will also be the last Sunday of our series called "Come to the Table." We'll celebrate with a potluck brunch after worship. Especially consider bringing a breakfast or lunch dish from another country.

On October 8 we will begin with a series of services focused on stewardship, gifts, and giving, with the theme, "God's Gifts, Our Hands." Look forward to hearing from several people about why they give to Solon United Methodist Church, and we hope to arrange some special music and presentations from youth and others with special talents.

We have not yet found a Christian Education Director, and I have heard that there is a wider shortage of applicants for Christian Ed positions. So we may need to rethink how to design a staff position to cover some of the needed coordination tasks for good programming, while using people we can find locally, and working more with volunteers to actually lead the programming.

We have gotten off to a good start with Sunday school and the after-school Treasure Seekers program, the Family Dinners, and the youth group with mostly volunteers. We also have a new adult Bible study class that has started on Wednesday evenings: Journey through the Bible. All of these thanks to many, many volunteers!

On October 15, the Council will have an information and conversation session after the service, to share some of the topics we have been discussing, and directions we have been looking for our church. It will include a financial update, proposals that will be voted on at the charge conference, what we need to assess how to make the best use of the parsonage, and looking at goals for the future, among other things.

On Thursday evening, October 26, will be our Circuit Charge Conference—eight churches meeting together, and it will include an educational component, to learn about family ministries. All Solon UMC members are encouraged to attend, to meet our new District Superintendent, Rev. Brian Oliver, and learn about what some of the other churches in our circuit are doing.

On Sunday October 29, we will conclude our focus on Stewardship and Giving and probably have some kind of celebration after the service. Details are still to be decided.

We will celebrate All Saints' Day the first Sunday in November.

God is doing many things in our midst, and surprising us with joy and healing and new possibilities.

UWF Missions: Willis Dady Homeless Shelter

The following was a plea made by the Willis Dady Homeless Shelter during the extreme temperatures in August.

With the rising temperatures expected to last for days, the Willis Dady Shelter says they do not have bed space available for the local homeless population who are out in the heat.

Cedar Rapids' homeless population has seen a 600% increase since, leaving local shelters scrambling to get resources out as best they can.



Denine Rushing is the shelter services director at Willis Dady. She says this summer heat left them limited for bed space all summer long.

"We have a total of about 30 single men's beds, and then we have 10 beds for veterans, and we also have four units where we shelter single women and families. And right now, our beds have been staying full," she said. Willis Dady is the only male shelter in Linn County.

"Water is a big thing, especially right now. So if anyone is able to donate cases of water we can always use those,"


Two cases of water (100 bottles) were immediately provided by UWF to the shelter.

MISSIONS: MAUI WILDFIRE RELIEF

We received notice from Midwest Mission on August 18 that they were in need of donations to help them provide help to those in need after the Maui Wildfires.

Thanks to you we were able to send a check for \$677 to Midwest Mission, Maui Wildfire Relief.

The following is from Midwest Mission email requesting help.

During the second week of August, wildfires sparked around the island of Maui that quickly led to a devastating inferno that destroyed the historic community of Lahaina.

The community of Lahaina was made up of local residents. This was their home — not their week of vacation or temporary living. Many of the people that had to evacuate and who lost everything, really lost everything. They lost pieces of their culture, their historic landmarks, and a piece of the island that was their own.



Shortly after the wildfires began, Midwest Mission was in contact with Convoy of Hope, out of Springfield, Missouri. Convoy of Hope was on the ground in Lahaina distributing disaster relief within a week of the fires igniting.

After discussing what we had and what their needs were, it was decided that we would send Bed Packs (sheet sets and bed pillows), Hygiene Kits, and Rice Meal Bags for Convoy to distribute at their discretion.

On Monday, August 28, a container arrived that would go to one of Convoy of Hope's warehouses in Sacramento, California. Needed items would be flown to Maui.

Midwest Mission's operations team loaded the container, and everyone gathered around to pray for the safety of the shipment and for those who had been impacted by the fire.

What was already a heart-wrenching moment became more personal as NOMAD volunteers, Mary and Mark Grant, shared their personal connection to the disaster.

"Our son Nick and his wife Beth have been in Lahaina for about 8 years now, and they lost everything," Mary shared with the group. As the fires spread towards their apartment complex, the couple fled on foot to safety.

"They were good people to lose things because they basically live out of their backpacks. They lived in a furnished apartment they were renting... but the apartment is gone, the car they were going to buy is gone, both of the dive shops they worked at are gone and all of the dive boats.

"They don't have jobs and they don't have stuff, but they don't really care about that.

"They care about being a part of that community. They really feel that Lahaina has become home. They have realized that most of the people who live in Lahaina are the ones who do the work on Maui - the ones who serve all the tourists and fix things and teach the kids. They want to be part of that community and help them as much as they can through all of this."

The couple was given a hotel room by their insurance company, but they gave it to someone else in need, and are staying with friends on different parts of the island. Since the fire, they have jumped in to help in the relief process, helping with tarps and gas, and they make supply runs for the community.

We were blessed to be able to hear a personal story about the people who are the recipients of the shipment that was sent off.

We don't know if Mark and Mary's son and daughter-in-law will receive our Hygiene Kits or Bed Packs, or maybe they will be assisting in the distribution of the supplies. But, we do know that needed resources will reach the people of Lahaina, because we serve a good God who is present in the midst of disasters.

May the supplies and the love that was sent with them bring hope in the midst of the crisis, and peace in the chaos.

Please be praying for everyone affected, and specifically for Nick and Beth as they seek to serve their community, even within their own devastation.

Bell Choir

Fall is here...the crispness of the air, the smell of harvest, shorter days, the colors of red, orange, yellow popping up on trees, in the fields, and flowers all around.

Most of all, I know when fall is here when bell choir practices start! Its members return to catch up from a fun filled summer off and with renewed energy to begin ringing and produce those wonderful sounds and songs that we love to hear.

Did you know that each handbell is a gift from a member or past member/s? In 1999 the Give-a-Bell Campaign was organized to acquire our 4-octave set of high-quality Malmark handbells. Additionally, through memorial gifts we have also been able to acquire the complementary hand-chimes. There is a personal inscription on each bell handle that carries the message designated by the donor(s). Check them out sometime.

I became director of our Celebration Bell Choir in January 2001. I had been a member of the handbell choir prior to this but had my doubts that I could actually direct this choir. Well, 21 years later, not only did I figure out how to direct a bell choir, but more importantly, I feel that I am able to challenge its members to play up to their full potential...to play and create music that brings so much beauty, fun and spiritual reflection to our services.

We have had many members (40) over the years...some with experience, some none at all. The bells are arranged like a piano, with low notes on one end and high notes on the other. Our choir takes each of these individual bells, with their own unique sounds and plays together to create a song that is beautiful and melodious. So even though there are many bells, each player, as they are ringing, makes this collection of sounds into one instrument! We have a lot of fun "playing" with the music (accents, volume, techniques, tempo) to make it the best version of what we are playing.

We would love to have others join us no matter what your musical background (or lack thereof). You can even start out

with one bell and then work your way to 2. Come and try it out, we would love to have you join us!

We practice on Wednesday nights at 7:15 PM. We perform on the 2nd Sunday of the month at the 9:00 service. Our next performance is scheduled for Sunday, October 8th.


