WEEK 7: THREE THINGS ABOUT SALVATION— PART TWO: THE DAILY PROCESS DAY 1: SALVATION PRESENT

Read Romans 5:6-11.

Remember the three things about salvation.

SALVATION PAST . . . Christ's blood causes you to become forgiven from sin forever and not to experience the punishment from sin.

SALVATION FUTURE . . . Christ's coming back will cause you to become free from the presence of sin.

SALVATION PRESENT . . . Christ living in you causes you to now be free from the power of sin.

A man in prison was told the governor of the state had given him a full pardon (forgiveness) for the things he has done wrong. The man in prison became happy. He asked to be let out of prison. The prison warden said, "No, we cannot let a man like you out of prison!"

WHAT VALUE IS FORGIVENESS IF YOU DON'T HAVE FREEDOM NOW?

Christ has given you, **right now**, freedom from sin's **power**. Study Romans 5:6-9.

What thing about salvation do these verses talk about? In the middle of verse ___, the point changes from salvation past to salvation future.

Romans 5:6-8 explains God's great love that sent Christ to die for sinners like us. This explanation of salvation past continues in verse 9. It says, "Now that we have been saved from the punishment of sin by the blood of Christ" (Rom. 5:9, NLV). The point changes to salvation future in the middle of that verse when He will save us from God's anger.

Romans 5:10 also begins by talking about **salvation past**. "We hated God. But we were saved from the punishment of sin by the death of Christ" (Rom. 5:10, NLV).

Then the verse talks about what other thing about salvation?

Who causes our **salvation present**? (See Rom. 5:10.)

WEEK 7: THREE THINGS ABOUT SALVATION— PART TWO: THE DAILY PROCESS DAY 2: SAVED BY HIS LIFE

Read Hebrews 2:14-15,18; 4:14-16; 1 Corinthians 10:13.

SAVED-BY-HIS-LIFE—**Salvation now** is because Jesus Christ lives in you. He gives you His power to cause you to become free from sin.

Does Jesus really understand your needs? your weaknesses? your temptations? Today's Scripture passages can help you realize He does understand all of these things.

Read Hebrews 4:14-16. These verses show Jesus in a way the Jewish people could easily understand. There was a **high priest** in the Jewish religion. He went to God and gave sacrifices so that sin could become forgotten. **What kind** of priest is Jesus? **Where** did He go?

Jesus is our **great** High Priest. He has gone to God. (See Heb. 4:14, NLV). **How** does Christ feel about the temptations to sin that we experience? (See v. 15.) **Why** does He feel that way

about your temptations?

Jesus understands your weaknesses. Why? Because He Himself was **tempted in every way we are tempted**. (See Heb. 4:15, NLV). Notice the important difference between Jesus and every other person who has lived: **He did not sin**.

The Bible tells us in Hebrews 4:16 that we are able to do something. Jesus has saved us and understands our temptations. What are we able to do?

Stop. Go with **complete trust** to the place of God's **loving favor**. Ask God for the strength you need to resist temptation. Read Hebrews 2:14-15,18 after you pray. What did Jesus do in verse 14 to help Him understand you perfectly?

Jesus became a man. He had the **same kind of flesh and blood** you have. How much did Jesus do to understand everything a person must experience on this earth?

One word in verse 14 gives the clear answer. He became flesh and blood and endured everything you must endure. He also shared the experience of **death**. There is nothing in your life

Jesus did not also experience. He faced the same things you face. Jesus's sharing experience caused two wonderful things to happen. One is in Hebrews 2:14. The other is in Hebrews 2:15. Finish these two sentences.

A few verses in the Bible are so important that you should never forget them. One of the 10 most important is 1 Corinthians 10:13. Read it now. Understand that **salvation present** is yours **today**. Your victory depends on Christ living in you. Christ has experienced everything you now experience. You are **saved by His life!**

WEEK 7: THREE THINGS ABOUT SALVATION— PART TWO: THE DAILY PROCESS DAY 3: VICTORY IN THE SPIRIT

Read Ephesians 5:18; John 7:37-39.

Christ living in you brings victory to every part of your life. Jesus was faced with everything you face. He did not sin. He will not permit you to be tempted more than you can resist. He will always give you a way to resist temptation and avoid sin.

He **protects** you. He gives you everything you need. Read Ephesians 5:18. This verse talks about a drunk person. Too much wine has changed his personality. All who meet him know that something is not normal about him. You are told in a like way to **be filled with the Spirit**. There is a change in your personality when you are filled with the Spirit. Other people who meet you will know that something is different about you. Being filled with the Spirit changes who you are and what you do just like drinking too much wine changes who you are and what you do.

It is important to know two things about a Greek word in Ephesians 5:18. The Greek word is translated **be filled**.

1. It is a word that means always do it, always be filled. 2. It is a command word—an order for us to obey. It is obvious that this is not a choice for the Christian life. YOU ARE ORDERED TO BE ALWAYS FILLED WITH THE HOLY SPIRIT. The apostle Paul (in Eph. 5:18) compared drinking wine to being filled with the Holy Spirit. Jesus compared things in the same way in John 7:37-39. Read those verses now. Who will give a drink? (See John 7:37.) What is the drink Jesus was talking about? (See John 7:39) Jesus said it was the Holy Spirit. (See John 7:39.) Paul said the same in Ephesians 5:18. (Look in v. 38.) What happens when a person has the Holy Spirit?_____ Rivers of living water will flow in your life. That is a beautiful picture. Does this remind you about your spiritual gifts that are ways for Christ's love to flow through you? Can you write your two memory verses about spiritual gifts?

WEEK 7: THREE THINGS ABOUT SALVATION— PART TWO: THE DAILY PROCESS DAY 4: WORKING OUT WHAT

GOD IS WORKING IN

Read Philippians 2:5-13; Hebrews 13:20-21.

Christ the Son of God understands everything you face in your daily life. He experienced it all for your benefit.

One of the clearest explanations of this is in Philippians 2:5-8. Read those verses now. It may help you know that verse 6 could be said, "Christ Jesus was in the form of God but did not think of equality with God as something he must hold on to." In verse 7, Jesus became like two things that show He was willing to experience anything you experience. What two words show this?

Did you write **servant** or **slave** in one of these blanks? Did you write **man** or **human** in the other blank? What word in verse 8

shows Jesus was willing to do
everything required to share your experience?
What did God do because Jesus was willing to die ? Rec Philippians 2:9-11. Write in your own words what God he done.
Here is one way to say it: "God has made Jesus higher the all and will cause all to confess that fact." Exactly what we every "tongue" say in verse 11?

Now read Philippians 2:12-13. Do these verses seem to be strange or in the wrong place? They come right after God has caused every tongue to confess that **Jesus Christ is Lord**. You are told that God has lifted Christ high above everything. Every knee must bow before Him. You are told to keep on working and to be afraid that you will not please Him. That is a strange thing to say.

Can you please God by working for your salvation past? No, you cannot. You have already memorized a verse that tells you this is impossible. Write Ephesians 2:8-10 here.

	The clearest explanation about the three things of salvation is in Philippians 1:6. Write that verse here:
Can you work for your salvation future? No, you have also memorized a verse that tells you how you will be saved. Write Romans 5:10 here.	
	Now read Hebrews 13:20-21. What will God teach you to do? What will God make you able to do?
This means that the command in Philippians 2:12 to work to show you have been saved must mean your salvation present (now)—that every day living with Christ where He fills and leads.	Whom does God use to cause it to become possible for you to do His will?
Notice the two kinds of work in Philippians 2:12-13. You are supposed to work to show your salvation. God is working in you to cause you to please Him. Salvation present means God's Spirit always being in your personality so His gifts can flow through you.	God is working in your life now through the power from Jesus Christ that lives in you. What is God doing in your life? Think about it during your Quiet Time. Write your thought on these lines.
Read again Philippians 2:12. Why are you supposed to be afraid? You are not supposed to be afraid God is angry and will punish you. No. It must mean something else. This is what it means. You fear missing God's blessing in your life. You fear not permitting God's Spirit to control you will cause you to not be able to please Him.	

WEEK 7: THREE THINGS ABOUT SALVATION— PART TWO: THE DAILY PROCESS DAY 5: SALVATION IS

RESCUE

Read Colossians 1:9-14.

It should be clear to you that God has done, is doing, and will do the action of salvation in your life. Salvation begins at a specific time: This is when you confess your sin and accept Christ as Lord. Salvation continues as a daily process. You become free from sin's power through Christ's living in you and controlling every thing. In the future Christ will take you away from the sin nature in your life.

Read Colossians 1:9-14. What verses explain salvation past? What verses explain salvation present? What verse explains salvation future?



Colossians 1:9 says Paul was praying for a special kind o knowledge. What was Paul praying for people to know?
God wants you, too, to know what He wants you to do. (See Col. 1:9, NLV.) He wants you to understand how His salvation i experienced in three ways—past, present, future. He want you to know that your salvation past is sure because of Christ' death on the cross. He wants you to feel that you have no doub about your salvation present (now). Christ's life gives you strength to resist temptation to sin. What Bible verse helps you know this. Write 1 Corinthians 10:13.
One important idea has been saved until our last study abou

One important idea has been saved until our last study about the three parts of salvation. Exactly what is **salvation**?

Imagine you are standing beside a lake. You see a man in the middle of the water. He cannot stay afloat. He will soon die if someone doesn't save him. What will kill him? **Water**. He will drown in **water**. He must be taken out of the **water** to be saved.



The word **salvation** means you need to be saved from something that will kill you. What will kill you? Colossians 1:14 tells you that **sin** will kill you. You are drowning in sin. You must be taken out of the **sin** to be saved.

Do you remember the meaning for *sin* in your SURVIVAL KIT? **Sin** means taking the "**I**" and making it the king of your life. **Sin** is an "**I**" problem.

You are in a dangerous situation when you live a **self**-owned, **self**-controlled, **self**-decided life. Colossians 1:13 says that people who live for themselves are in a life of darkness. This kind of life will destroy a person.

Salvation is leaving the self's life and getting the Christ's life. Salvation is not only a way to die. It is not only a life insurance policy for eternal life. It is much, much more. SALVATION IS GOD SAVING YOU FROM A SELF-DIRECTED LIFE. He took you out of that situation at a specific time. He makes it possible for you to live with Christ directing your life as a daily process. He will in the future make you free forever from the possibility of a self-life. That is salvation.

Be sure you understand this point. You need to know what salvation means for the rest of your life with Christ. You have been "called out" of a world where everyone lives for himself. You have been put into a body of people, the body of Christ. All in this body have the desire for Christ to be their Lord and their King. They are together. They have chosen to be Christ-controlled rather than self-controlled. Salvation means becoming controlled by Christ.

Read again Colossians 1:9-14. Read these verses slowly. Salvation is the changing of owners from **you** to **Christ**.

Remember that all of this is possible because Christ died for you on the cross. He took your past life into His own sinless body. He accepted the punishment that should have been for you. He caused you to become free. Then He rose from the dead to fill you with His own Spirit. He has a purpose for your life. His plan for your life is to use you to let His love go through. THAT IS A WONDERFUL LIFE!
